Dear Senator Murkowski, Sullivan, and Congressman Young:

I write to express support for S.804, the Empowering Rural Economies Through Alaska Native Sustainable Arts and Handicrafts Act, a bill that amends the Marine Mammal Protection Act to prohibit any state or locality from banning the importation, sale, barter, or possession of an authentic native handicraft article of mammoth, mastodon, or walrus ivory or marine mammal bones that have been produced by an Alaska Native. It is critical S.804 is enacted into law and we appreciate your commitment to our ivory carvers, Native ways of living with walrus, and support for our rural economies.

The Bering Strait region is home to diverse Inuit cultures including St. Lawrence Island Yupik, Central Yupik and Inupiag communities. Inherent to our Native ways of living is the sustainable harvest of walrus. Our hunters and ivory carvers carry with them generations of knowledge in living our way of life. Ivory carvers are our living culture bearers, reflecting the customary and traditional use of walrus ivory. The sale of our Native art is often the sole source of cash income providing for the basic living needs for many Inuit families and supports a culturally relevant local economy in our communities.

In effort to see the bill move through Congress, Kawerak Inc. does not object to amendments requested by conservation groups on fossilized mammoth or mastodon ivory so long as the Native right to utilize fossilized ivory is preserved and that fossilized walrus ivory is also protected from being banned by states. We deeply appreciate your commitment in protecting our way of life in support of our ivory carvers. Thank you for your hard work in moving this bill forward.
