## \*Remarks\*

The Community of Gambell created a temporary berm of about 1,500 feet to combat initial storm surges high waves along the lower lying portion of the western shoreline of Gambell. There were about 8 to 10 homes including the teacher housing that were endangered after initial surge, fortunately wave heights did not rise back to initial surge heights after low tide, of the 2 homes that did evacuate they chose to shelter in relatives homes further in town and did not need the use of designated shelter of Gambell Schools.

In the event of future larger storms with longer high sea surges the community of Gambell is lacking in several key pieces of heavy equipment to combat build and maintain berms/levees for extended durations, such as a Rock truck to haul large amount of gravel/soil, and an additional loader as well as a dozer.

In closing the community of Gambell was very fortunate to not have faced the brunt of this current storm and the potential destruction it left in its wake as it did with many other communities along the western Alaska coast.
